IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN...

Spring Thaw and Solid Waste Management

Has your mixed metals pile grown over the winter?

Hauling material away for recycling before spring break-up can help set your site up for success. The following options should be considered by your community to ensure you are moving out as much material as possible as economically as possible:

- Check with your regional landfill and ask which companies collect their material and when they have their next scheduled pick up:
- Call a couple of processors in your area to see who is available and will offer the best service;
- Aggregate all of your metals into one area that provides adequate space for equipment to maneuver safely;
- Encourage community members to clean up their yards and bring segregated materials to the transfer station before the thaw; and
- Ensure site attendants are wearing appropriate PPE and are limiting physical contact with waste materials.

Installment one of the Pathway to Success series is dedicated to communication, job searching, interviewing skills, and what to expect when you land your job! It's a great opening series that will give participants a solid set of skills and attributes that employers today are looking for. Although the course content is online, we will be mailing out a course manual to participants, allowing them to follow along during the course. The manual contains more detailed information about each subject area and provides participants with a more well-rounded learning experience.

Participants will be primed and polished after taking this introductory course and will be well on their way to impressing employers and securing roles suited to their success.

Join us for Series 1 and come prepared for an information-packed, activity-driven, knowledge-based way to securing the job you want!

This series is geared to Alberta First Nations Youth aged 15-30. The commitment is one hour one evening per week from 7:30 pm – 8:30 pm (with an additional 30 minute open forum for additional discussion) for 5 weeks. Participants will receive communication help, resume building assistance, interviewing training, as well as job hunting and securing a role 'what to expect' information. Successful participants will receive a TSAG course certificate upon course completion.







How it Works

- Patients, families, or caregivers/allied health professionals may call the toll free number to speak with a Medical Office Assistant (MOA) and request an appointment with our physicians
- Patient's scheduled appointment with the doctor will take place using secure protocols for virtual care. If the patient has access to the internet, the appointment will be a video call from the patient's location
- Patients who do not have internet access can request a phone appointment
- Nurses or Community Health Centre staff can request appointments with or on behalf of their patients and the appointments can take place at the Health Centre using the telehealth equipment or at the patient's location
- All patients will be connected with appropriate local clinical resources including family doctors,
 if available
- All participating physicians have committed to the principles and practices of cultural safety and humility and have established positive working relationships with Indigenous communities

Local Addressing Systems for First Nations

TSAG's lead GIS technician, Gregg Muller, has been busy working with First Nations in Alberta to establish local addressing information that Nations can have available for everything from improved emergency management accessibility to better food and parcel delivery options. TSAG works closely with key stakeholders in each community that can liaise with local leadership and choose to select names for roads in the nation or apply a grid system (or a combination of both).



Following leadership approval the new addressing information is uploaded into the Alberta Municipal Data Sharing Partnership (AMDSP) as well as Google Maps. The AMDSP is a non-profit entity that supplies addressing information to emergency management agencies across Alberta. Our goal is having easy-to-use house addresses and road names for all Nations.
